In his second main work *The Struggle for Recognition: Moral Grammar of Social Conflicts*, the recognition concept is derived mainly from G. W. F. Hegel’s early social philosophical works, but is supplemented by George Herbert Mead’s social psychology, Jürgen Habermas’ communicative ethics, and Donald Winnicott’s object relations theory. Honneth’s critical adaptation of these is the basis of his critical social theory, which attempts to remedy the deficits of previous approaches.
